In Junicode, special attention has been paid to letter-combinations that often look unattractive in Old English text: these are handled by ligatures and alternate forms of f, þ and ð. To take fullest advantage of typographical features for Old English, make sure these OpenType features are enabled in your application: ccmp (Glyph Composition/Decomposition), calt (Contextual Alternates), liga (Standard Ligatures), kern (Horizontal Kerning).
